



CAVES, THE PEARLS OF THE UNDERGROUND

A cave is a natural earth hollow or passage large enough for a human to enter, which mainly forms in our regions as a result of geological processes and most frequently occurs as a result of the action of water

Water, rich with carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>), seeps through cracks and faults in a limestone rock, which in return dissolves the limestone. Dissolved carbonates precipitate into Karst caves, where it deposits and forms into various cave formations or speleothems, if a speleothem hangs from the ceiling, we call it a stalactite and if it rises from the ground, we call it a stalagmite. When they meet and join, they form a column. There are a number of other cave formations and ornaments such as straws, curtains,

Karst caves are also known for their unique animal life or fauna. Animals which spend a lifetime underground, have adapted to such conditions and would not be able to survive in any other different environment, are the authentic cave dwellers or troglobionts. They are mostly blind; therefore other senses have developed instead of their sight. Most true cave dwellers are small, tiny invertebrates. The only vertebrate in the Dinar Karst, which lives in
